**Verzoeken tot internationale
bescherming en gender :
een bibliografie**

De NANSEN TOOL is een thematisch instrument dat is ontworpen voor juristen en advocaten die verzoekers om internationale bescherming bijstaan. Het biedt praktische en direct bruikbare hulpmiddelen voor juristen en iedereen die geïnteresseerd is in het onderwerp.

Een initiatief om academisch onderzoek dichter bij het middenveld te brengen

Om het werk en het denken van iedereen die betrokken is bij de internationale beschermingsprocedure te ondersteunen, draagt deze NANSEN Tool bij aan het in kaart brengen van de situatie van personen met een gendergerelateerde vrees voor vervolging. Ze maakt ook deel uit van de initiatieven van NANSEN om een interdisciplinaire benadering van asiel te ontwikkelen en nieuwe dynamiek tot stand te brengen om academisch onderzoek naar internationale bescherming te voeden en te brengen dichter bij het veld.

De Tool sluit ook aan bij een interne denkprocess over de prioritaire behandeling bij NANSEN van dossiers van personen in kwetsbare situaties. Sinds het begin van haar activiteiten heeft NANSEN slachtoffers van gendergerelateerd geweld bijgestaan, evenals slachtoffers van foltering en mensen met zware psychologische problemen¹. In de loop van 2022 heeft NANSEN deze werk kunnen verdiepen². Onder de uitgevoerde activiteiten wenste NANSEN twee onderzoeksters van de Universiteit Gent te voorzien van een selectie van individuele dossiers (11), andere dossiers komen gedeeltelijk voort uit het onderzoek van de onderzoekers zelf (5). Dit voorstel tot samenwerking werd goedgekeurd door het wetenschappelijk comité van de onderzoeksters. Zij stelden de inhoud van een Praktijkgids zelfstandig op. Als aanvulling op de Praktijkgids ‘Gendergerelateerde Procedures om Internationale Bescherming: Seksueel en gendergerelateerd geweld, seksuele oriëntatie en genderidentiteit’ stelt NANSEN een bibliografie (in het Engels) voor over gender in vluchtelingenrecht en mensenrechten, met een lijst van nuttige bronnen.

De Praktijkgids werd geschreven door Lore Roels³ en Liselot Casteleyn⁴, beiden onderzoeker aan de Universiteit Gent binnen de *Migration Law Research Group (MigrLaw)*⁵, het *Human Rights Centre (HRC)*⁶ en het *Centre for the Social Study of Migration and Refugees (CESSMIR)*⁷. Zij voeren er een vierjarig doctoraatsonderzoek uit onder begeleiding van Prof. Dr. Ellen Desmet⁸ en respectievelijk Prof. Dr. Ines Keygnaert⁹ (binnen het *International Centre for Reproductive Health, ICRH*)¹⁰ en Prof. Dr. Marlies Casier¹¹. Deze onderzoeken focussen op de verzoekprocedure om IB en de plaats van respectievelijk seksueel en gendergerelateerd geweld¹² (SGG) en seksuele oriëntatie en genderidentiteit¹³ (SOGI) hierin.

NANSEN is van mening dat de Praktijkgids een hulpmiddel kan zijn voor alle juristen die overlevenden en/of slachtoffers van SGG bijstaan met hun verzoek tot internationale

Bibliografie: gendergerelateerde verzoeken om internationale bescherming

INLEIDING | Deze bibliografie het resultaat van een grondige literatuuronderzoek en is bedoeld voor alle betrokken actoren van de verzoekprocedure om internationale bescherming. Het brengt specifieke, potentieel nuttige middelen samen om juridische redenering in gendergerelateerde asielprocedures te ondersteunen. Het vormt een aanvulling op de middelen die worden genoemd in de Praktijkgids ‘Gendergerelateerde Procedures om Internationale Bescherming: Seksueel en gendergerelateerd geweld, seksuele oriëntatie en genderidentiteit’ van de UGent.

STRUCTUUR | De bibliografie bevat: een inhoudsopgave, de bibliografie zelf, een ‘nuttige databases en links’ sectie, en een alfabetische lijst met bronnen (op het einde). In drie onderdelen biedt de bibliografie bronnen over:

- I) Het relevant juridisch en beleidskader op Belgisch niveau (nationale wetgeving, beleidsdocumenten ...), de Europese richtlijnen (EU verdragen en richtlijnen van de Raad van Europa...) en het VN-niveau (VN-verdragen en verdragsorganen algemene aanbevelingen, richtlijnen en handboeken ...)
- II) Gender en asiel in het algemeen evenals geselecteerde onderwerpen
→ De ondertitels in sectie II) zijn gecategoriseerd volgens argumenten die door de asielinstanties regelmatig gebruikt worden in het kader van de behandeling van verzoeken om internationale bescherming die betrekking hebben met SGG. Onder elke ondertitel wordt een korte uitleg van deze argumenten gegeven.
- III) Specifieke vormen van SGG die relevant zijn voor de asielprocedure (seksueel geweld, genitale verminking/-besnijdenis van vrouwen, seksuele (mensenhandel en) uitbuiting, huiselijk geweld, gedwongen huwelijk en geweld met betrekking tot eer- en gendernormen), eindigend met een specifieke sectie over mannelijke overlevenden / slachtoffers van SGBV

De bronnen worden weergegeven in tabellen, die de lezer een nummer (1e kolom) geven, de bibliografische referentie (2e kolom) en sleutelwoorden die de inhoud van de tekst (3e kolom) aangeven.

BEPERKINGEN | Deze bibliografie bevat voornamelijk juridische en beleidsdocumenten, academische artikelen / boeken / hoofdstukken en rapporten van internationale organisaties. Hoewel de lijst een aantal verwijzingen naar jurisprudentie bevat, valt een substantiële analyse van de jurisprudentie buiten het toepassingsgebied van deze bronlijst. Hetzelfde geldt voor literatuur over asielaanvragen in verband met seksuele geaardheid en / of genderidentiteit (SOGI), aangezien deze complexe kwestie op zichzelf een aanvullende bibliografie zou rechtvaardigen.

REFERENTIES | De referenties zijn opgesteld volgens de OSCOLA-referentieregels. Ze duiden specifieke pagina's/alinea's aan wanneer het document niet in zijn geheel relevant is.

Als het hele document relevant is, bevat de referentie geen verdere specificatie van de locatie. Wanneer een bron voor de tweede keer in de lijst verschijnt, wordt deze op een verkorte manier (weergegeven en is terug te voeren in de alfabetische lijst met bronnen). 2. Gender & asylum: selected topics

2.1. Gender in relation to the UN Refugee Convention grounds

This section lists literature on the link between sexual and gender-based persecution and the 'Convention grounds' in the 1951 UN Refugee Convention. While some advocate for including 'gender' as a convention ground as such, others emphasise that the almost exclusive use of 'particular social group' in SGBV-related asylum procedures ignores the complexity of SGBV experiences and excludes these from the socio-political contexts in which they prevail.

2.2. Credibility assessment

2.2.1. Credibility assessment: in general

This sections highlights barriers for SGBV survivors/victims to narrate a flight story that is perceived as credible in the asylum procedure. Such barriers may relate to trauma, shame, the functioning of our memory, stressful interview circumstances, the image of an ideal SGBV refugee... . The relevance of this literature is confirmed by the fact that a lack of credibility appears to be the core reason for refusals of SGBV-related asylum applications today.

2.2.2. Delayed/non-reporting in country of origin and delayed (disclosure in) asylum procedure

This section presents literature rebutting the assumption that the following situations cause suspicion towards the credibility of an applicant's flight story: 1) delayed or non-reporting of SGBV experiences in the country of origin, 2) delayed filing of an application for international protection related to SGBV in the host country, and 3) delayed disclosure of SGBV experiences in the asylum procedure in the host country. In contrast to what is often argued by asylum authorities, disclosure of SGBV must be considered as a process, instead of a one-time event and disclosure may be hampered by substantial barriers.

2.2.4. Resourcefulness of applicant

This section deals with the allusions made by asylum authorities to the belief that resourceful applicants do not need international protection against SGBV . Related arguments tend to overemphasise applicants' (perceived) resourcefulness and coping mechanisms to deal with SGBV, which overshadows the broader social and institutional structures determining their ability to deal with such persecution. This applies to both material (e.g. financial stability, social network, housing, job...) and personal/mental resources (age, gender, autonomy, assertiveness...).

2.3. Internal flight alternative

This section provides literature on the viability of the often-presented 'internal flight alternative' for survivors/victims of SGBV. Specifically, it deals with the fact that such arguments often overlook the particular difficulties faced by survivors/victims, including legal, cultural and/or social restrictions or prohibitions on travelling or living alone, problems of securing accommodation, childcare and economic survival without family or community support, and risk of harassment and exploitation, including revictimization of sexual exploitation and violence.

2.4. Public/private divide

This section includes literature rebutting the often-made assumption that forms of SGBV belong to the 'private sphere' and therefore fall outside the scope of international refugee law. This type of reasoning resonates with the thinking pattern that "if the harm is inflicted privately, then it suffices that the women find help privately as well". However, it overlooks the socio-cultural structures in which such violence is embedded and against which an individual is often powerless.

2.5. Private (male) support network

This section provides literature on the viability of the often-proposed solution to SGBV survivors/victims to seek protection with a private (often male) support network instead of international protection. In arguing this, asylum authorities for example tend to overlook the *de facto* protective qualities of such networks, their lack of any obligation to provide protection, and the risks for further victimisation in the newly formed power structures that such networks entail.

2.6. State protection

Asylum authorities often argue that survivors/victims of SGBV have not exhausted state protection pathways by not reporting their experiences to the authorities, without assessing the effectiveness or reasonability of such protection. In addition, they tend to argue that the existence of local laws criminalising such violence or local NGOs/shelters oriented at SGBV survivors/victims can replace state protection as such. This section provides literature

rebutting these arguments and others related to the requirement of a state unwilling/unable to provide protection.
